


Indian Education spotlights creativity

Summer School enrollment information

High school summer school is open to students who were in grades 9-12 during the 2003-2004 school year and to students who have completed 8th grade and have a counselor recommendation. Students who have received a high school diploma or General Equivalency Certificate are NOT eligible to participate in summer school. All students are encouraged to talk with their counselor regarding appropriate course selections.

LPS STUDENTS REGISTRATION PROCEDURES Registration for summer school will begin on April 26, 2004 and students may register in their home school through May 28, 2004. Students should contact their counselor for registration information. On June 9, 2004 students can register for summer school at the Lincoln High Summer School office 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Late registration dates/times are June 10th and 11th from 12:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. only.

NOTE: Students may NOT enroll either of those two mornings while classes are in session. No registrations will be accepted after June 11, 2004 at 4:30 p.m. All tuition and fees must be paid at the time of registration. A receipt will be issued to you. BE SURE TO KEEP YOUR RECEIPT.

Important dates to remember

- Last date to withdraw from a class with no grade assigned is June 23, 2004.
- \bullet Last date to withdraw from a class with a "Withdraw" assigned is June 30, 2004.
- \bullet Students with drawing from a class after June 30, 2004 will receive a grade of "F".
- Mid-quarter grades will be assigned on June 30, 2004.
- Final grades will be assigned on July 22, 2004.
