

During the 2020-2021 school year, we accomplished many goals. We are so proud of the way our students, families, and staff adapted to our pandemic procedures and the flexibility we all demonstrated. As we begin a new school year, we understand the importance to continue to challenge all of our students.

This year, we will continue to make student learning our top priority, with the goal of every child showing significant academic growth throughout the year. Over the summer, our teachers have received extensive training in strategies for academic growth. There are many instructional programs and strategies in place to ensure student success. Our Guided Reading structure provides instruction at each student's instructional level and students advance accordingly. Technology is provided and used as a way to differentiate daily instruction. Many web-based programs will be used in addition to the core curriculum each child will receive. Also, teachers will incorporate Google Classroom, Zoom, and Classroom Dojo as ways to provide instruction and incentives for students. This technology will allow students to be challenged and engaged.

There will also continue to be a strong focus on attendance. Incentives for students will be provided throughout the year. Students who are at school every day with no tardies and no early dismissals will receive a perfect attendance pencil and a certificate each quarter. Our goal is to have at least 96% of our students at school each day. We know that student learning is maximized when everyone is in attendance and able to participate in the learning activities.

There will be many opportunities this year to get involved. The Family Literacy Program Group provides ESL classes and parenting information daily from 8:30 am – 10:30 am. Please call the school office for more information. I encourage all parents to be involved and see the great things that are happening at Everett!

The 20th year of the Everett CLC adventure is upon us. We will continue to strive towards creating collaborative partnerships which provide support, services, and opportunities that lead to: improved student learning and development; stronger families; and healthier neighborhoods. The CLCs are designed to link the community, the schools, and people of all ages and backgrounds to achieve the stated goals. Each CLC is a delivery system that uses the schools as a hub for service. Each center provides safe, supervised, integrated, and inclusive out-of-school programs through community-wide collaborative partnerships.

"THE CORE" CLC After School Experience (\$131/month) is designed to provide developmentally appropriate enrichment activities in literacy, math, science, arts/crafts, character/leadership, service learning, computer/technology and recreation/ leisure. Through the support of homework completion and opportunities for social development every student enrolled will be exposed to enriching experiences daily. This program is offered to students K-5. It will be held after the normal school day from 2:53-6:00 PM.

"THE CORE" CLC After School Experience offers multiple child discounts and need-based scholarships. The CLC is approved to accept Title XX. Contact the Lincoln Parks & Recreation Playground Office (441-7952) for more information.

ENRICHMENT CLUBS/ACTIVITIES are free to all Everett students, unless stated on the registration form. Registrations are distributed via student folders a few weeks prior to the beginning of each quarter.



School Rules & Behavior Expectations

The Everett community including students, parents, administration, and staff will work together to create and maintain a safe, caring environment that promotes teaching and learning. At Everett, we focus on providing a positive behavior system. This includes proactive strategies for defining, teaching, and supporting appropriate student behaviors to create positive school learning environments. Teaching positive behavior is more effective than punishing negative behavior. We know that when good behavior and good teaching come together, our students will excel in their learning. The expectations listed below will enhance the development of a positive learning environment.

- Be Respectful We will treat others with respect and care.
- Be Responsible We will display good citizenship and acknowledge responsibility for behavior.
- **Be Safe** We will have the responsibility to practice self-discipline skills to ensure safety for all.

During the first week of school and throughout the school year, staff will focus on teaching students the behavior expectations for all areas of our school. Our goal is to "catch kids being learners". When students know that their positive behavior is clearly defined, taught, recognized and reinforced, they are more likely to respond with positive behavior choices. The Behavior Expectation Ma- trix (page 8) describes in more detail the expectations we have for students.

We know that students can have challenges to consistently display appropriate behavior due to a variety of reasons. To further support our students, we help students to work on the following goals for life:

- I can be productive and follow directions, even if I am mad.
- I can be productive and follow directions, even if others are not okay.
- I can be productive and follow directions, even if I don't want to.

Everett's Mission Statement

The mission of Everett Elementary is to prepare and empower students to be lifelong learners.

Our mission statement is:

At Everett we soar to excellence in education and character through effort and leadership.

Everett's Goals for Students

It is the goal of Everett that every student meet the following school improvement goals:

- 1. All students improve math skills across grade levels.
- 2. All students improve literacy skills across grade levels.

Towards that end, the staff at Everett partners with parents and guardians to achieve these goals on a daily basis. The following are suggestions parents can use to get students prepared to learn:

• Get to know your child's teacher. As a parent you know your child best. Share what you know with the teacher: interests, favorite book, concerns you may have, etc.

 Make sure your child gets enough sleep. Tired children can't do their best work. Establish a routine for bedtime and adhere to it.

 Talk to the teacher about what is expected of your child in school. Every family should set aside homework time and model for children the process of learning.

- Limit TV and video game time. Studies show that children who do best in school watch the least amount of TV/video games. When you first turn off the TV/ video game, you will have to help your child find other things to do – read a book, take a walk, visit the library, play a game.
- Chores are an important part of a child's life.
 They provide children the foundation upon which responsibility and high self-esteem are built. Research shows that children who do chores without reminders or parent persuasion are very successful at their first job called SCHOOL.

Telephone Calls

The Everett telephone number is 436-1159. Calls to the office will be answered from 7:30 am until 4:00 pm. Students will not be called out of class for phone calls unless it is an emergency.

The school phone is for business purposes. Students may not use the phone except in an emergency or with a note from the teacher. Please speak to your child about making arrangements with you before school about staying after school, visits to friends, etc.

Arrival And Dismissal Procedures

Arrival

Everett Elementary School campus is closed until 8:00 am. Prior to that time, no supervision is available, and students are not to be on school grounds. Students will enter Everett using the same doors they use during our dismissal. These doors are:

Door 1 – 1st and 4th grades

Door 3 – 2nd and 5th grades

Door 8 – Kindergarten and 3rd grades

Breakfast

Breakfast is provided daily to students at no cost to families. Students will enter the building at 8:00 am and get a grab and go breakfast as they enter the building. Students will eat breakfast in their classroom at 8:08 am. Students will be supervised and wait in the hallway until the bell rings at 8:08 am. Students should not arrive prior to supervision at 8:00 am.

Dismissal

Students will be dismissed by teachers at 2:53 pm and will leave the building through their designated doors. All students must go directly home or to a school sanctioned after school activity. Students who are participating in CLC will meet a CLC staff member at a designated location to be escorted to the program area.

After-School Guidelines

- School Campus (including the playground) is closed until 6:00 pm except for use by school childcare and clubs. Reservations for rooms/playground should be entered in the district Archibus system.
- If students are to be picked up at school and no one has arrived by 3:00 pm, school staff will attempt to contact parents.
- Afterschool plans need to be made in advance.

Traffic Patterns

Many children will arrive at school in vehicles, on bikes, or by walking. If your child is one that will arrive and leave in a vehicle, please take time to review the following information. If you are carpooling, please drop off and pick up students in the West (Door 8) and North (Door 1) cutouts. Please do not leave your vehicle unattended or block traffic. You may also find a location a block or so away from the school as a drop-off and pick-up location. It will be important that everyone practices kindness and patience with the following patterns.

Guidelines for safety


In order to have a safe and orderly dismissal of students it will be important that everyone observe the following procedures.

- When you enter the cut out, pull up as far as possible.
- Stay in your car. Your child will find you.
- Pull forward when the car in front of you pulls away. This allows the cars at the end of the line to get in.
- If there are no parking spots available, drive around the block.
 Double parked cars create a hazard for both students and adults.
- When crossing the street, go to the crosswalk. Most children get hit when they dodge between cars.
- Be patient. Most traffic is cleared within 10 minutes.
- Students should cross streets using the proper crosswalks as indicated by double white lines on the pavement. Children needing to cross

9th and 10th streets should use the traffic lights located at 9th and D Street or 10th and D Street or the lights located at 9th and A or 10th and A Street. Children crossing 13th Street should use the traffic lights located at D Street or A Street. Students walking to school enter the building at their designated door.

Vehicle Travel

Using the following traffic flow pattern (right) and the guidelines listed above will allow for safety and efficiency.

Student Conduct

Behavioral Expectations

Any conduct which causes or which creates reasonable likelihood that it will cause disruption or interference with any school function, activity, or purpose or such conduct that interferes with the health, safety, and well being or the rights of other students is prohibited by the Board of Education.

It is with this belief that Everett Elementary has chosen to establish the following school rules:

- 1. Be Respectful
- 2. Be Responsible
- 3. Be Safe

Our focus is to define, teach, practice and reinforce appropriate learning behaviors. We work to strengthen the prevention process so that students can successfully demonstrate behaviors that will help them learn.

We are committed to helping children learn that they can problem solve, they can act in a way that will not make a problem for themselves or others, and that staff at Everett School will hold them accountable for their behaviors.

When children are hurtful or disruptive at Everett, teachers will ask them to immediately stop and change the behavior. If this one redirection does not alter the behavior, the child will be asked to move to another location in the room or with a partner teacher. At one or more of those locations, children will be asked to complete a "getting back on track sheet" that may be sent home for a parent signature. This sheet will provide information about the child's actions that were hurtful or disruptive and show the child that the partnership between the school, teacher and family is strong and supportive.

Children will be referred immediately to the office for:

- 1. Physical violence directed to an adult. Suspension, from class or school may result. Parent/teacher/administrator conference may be required.
- 2. Physical violence directed to a student. Suspension, from class or school may result. Parent/teacher/administrator conference may be required.
- 3. Profanity directed to an adult. Suspension, from class or school may result. Parent/teacher/administrator conference may be required.
- 4. Profanity directed to a student. Suspension from class or school may result. Parent/teacher/administrator conference may be required.
- 5. Bringing items that are considered to be weapons such as knives, bullets, fireworks, etc.

While no one menu of consequences parallels children's misbehavior, staff will continue to implement logical learning opportunities. Contact your child's teacher or an administrator to learn more about this behavioral approach.

Positive Reinforcement

Students who need few reminders to behave properly, are able to take more responsibility, and make good choices are given positive reinforcement for their efforts. This could include being allowed to line up first in class, being a helper, etc. Many more ideas are brainstormed within grade levels.

Lunch/Breakfast at School SNAP

Lunch may be purchased at school. Breakfast is provided at no cost to families. Money can be deposited in your child's meal account that has been secured with their personal identification number. Students have personalized PIN numbers. The PIN number will only be used with the school lunch program. The number needs to be kept confidential to ensure no one else uses the child's account for meal purchases. If your child is new to the Lincoln Public Schools a number will be assigned to them. Students in grades K*-5 will need to learn their number so that they can enter it on the keypad located in the cafeteria.

*Kindergarten students will access their account with teacher assistance until such time that they also learn their number.

Parent(s)/guardian(s) will be notified when the amount in the account gets low or overdrawn by a note from the cafeteria. We ask that you help your child keep track of their lunch account status. Deposits to the student's account can be in any amount. Please use the envelope provided to assure accurate posting to your child's account.

Lunch Off Campus

If for any reason a child eats lunch at any place other than school, they must have a signed/dated note from their parent or guardian giving them permission to do so. Students are allowed to go home during lunchtime if the student is not tardy for afternoon classes and if there is a parent/guardian or another adult home during lunchtime. Such lunch arrangements will need administrator knowledge and approval. Please make arrangements in advance.

STUDENT BREAKFAST AND LUNCH MEALS FREE FOR ALL STUDENTS FOR 2021-22 SCHOOL YEAR: Students have the choice of selecting a cold breakfast (ex: cereal and mini breakfast bar) or hot breakfast (ex: breakfast pizza) plus receive 100% fruit juice, low fat milk and optional ½ c serving of fruit. A school lunch consists of a choice of two or more hot entrees, chef salad or meatless entrée plus a salad, vegetable, fruit and milk. Purchase of carton of cow's milk is 50 cents.

NEW FREE AND REDUCED MEAL APPLICATION IS REQUIRED EACH SCHOOL YEAR:

Free and reduced applications are not renewable – they do not carry over from year to year. Families who receive a letter from Lincoln Public Schools Nutrition Services Department stating that their children have been Direct Certified for free or reduced meal benefits do not need to complete an application –please make sure all the school age children in your home are included in this letter. If one or more of your children are not listed - please call the Nutrition Services office at 402-436-1746. Free and Reduced Meal Application will be available on-line at lps.org. The on-line application is fast and secure taking only one to two working days to process. If you apply on-line and have an e-mail address registered with LPS, you will receive an e-mail notification as soon as your application has been processed. Paper applications may take as long as ten (10) working days to process. Nutrition Services is not responsible for lost paper applications. Free and reduced meal benefits may allow a family to receive fee waiver benefits.

Breakfast

Breakfast is provided daily to students at no cost to families. Students will enter the building at 8:00 am and get a grab and go breakfast as they enter the building. Students will eat breakfast in their classroom at 8:08 am. Students will be supervised and wait in the hallway until the bell rings at 8:08 am. Students should not arrive prior to supervision at 8:00 am.

Special Lunchroom Seating

Many children and their parents enjoy having lunch together in the lunchroom. The tables on the east edge of the cafeteria are available for you and your child. To make this time special for your child, please follow these guidelines:

- Your child may choose one classmate to join him/her
- No more than four people at each table
- So that two families may eat at any one time, tables should not be moved together
- Children will need to be back in the classrooms when the 30 minute lunch period is over
- Tables will need to be wiped down and chairs lined up at the conclusion of lunch

Additional Food Items in the Cafeteria

Students are always welcome to bring cold lunch from home. As with hot lunch, food items may not be traded or shared. If a student is having cold lunch, they may bring a drink item. (We ask that no soda be brought to school). Students are NOT to bring drink items if they are eating hot lunch. Students may always bring \$.50 to purchase milk/juice from the cafeteria.

Bullying

If you feel that your child is being bullied by peers, please contact your child's teacher or the building principal, Mike Long. All reported incidences of bullying/unsafe behavior will follow the protocol outlined in Lincoln Public Schools Board Policy 5482: Anti-Bullying Policy.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.

In order to be considered bullying, the behavior must include:

- Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.
- Repetition: Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.
- Hurtful aggressive physical and/or verbal behavior.

Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose.

As an added prevention piece, please discuss with your child adults in the building who they can talk to if they feel that they are being bullied or are in an unsafe situation. These people may include, but are not limited to, their teacher, the administrator, school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker or any other adult in the building that they have built a positive relationship with.

Students are taught about what bullying looks like and sounds like, along with how to advocate for themselves through the District's Second Step program.
