

# BULLYING

If you feel that your child is being bullied by peers, please contact your child's teacher or the building principal, Mrs. Pam Hale. All reported incidences of bullying/unsafe behavior will follow the protocol outlined in Lincoln Public Schools Board Policy 5482: Anti-Bullying Policy.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.

In order to be considered bullying, the behavior must include:

- Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.
- Repetition: Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.
- Hurtful aggressive physical and/or verbal behavior.

Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose.

As an added prevention piece, please discuss with your child adults in the building who they can talk to if they feel that they are being bullied or are in an unsafe situation. These people may include, but are not limited to, their teacher, the administrator, school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker or any other adult in the building that they have built a positive relationship with.

Students are taught about what bullying looks like and sounds like, along with how to advocate for themselves through the District's Second Step program.







## **INFORMATION ABOUT LUNCH**

Students at Norwood Park have 30 minutes for their lunch break each day. During this time students will get their lunch, eat and use the restroom. Students have the option to order a hot lunch from the cafeteria or bring a cold lunch from home.

**Please Note:** *Students are not to bring pop or candy as part of their lunch.* We encourage you to send nutritious and healthy food items for lunch. As part of our school-wide Health and Wellness program we encourage students to eat a lot of fruit and vegetables, healthy grains, dairy and protein to energize their bodies for learning!

# ARRIVAL

AM Preschool – 8:15–11:45 a.m. PM Preschool – 12:15–3:45 p.m. Kindergarten-5th Grade 8:55 a.m. – 3:38 p.m. Norwood Park Campus closed until 8:50 a.m.

# BREAKFAST

Breakfast is served between 8:30 a.m. and 8:55 a.m. Students arriving for breakfast should not arrive before 8:30 a.m., as there is no supervision at that time.

## **MORNING ARRIVAL**

Students should arrive no earlier than 8:50 a.m. to line up for class. Students report directly to their designated outside door. Supervision will be available at 8:50 a.m.

# LATE ARRIVALS (TARDY)

Children K-5th grade, arriving after 9:00 a.m., are tardy and must report to the main office for a classroom admittance slip. A tardy counts towards the daily absence accumulated total.

# DISMISSAL

- All K-5 students are dismissed from the building at 3:38 p.m. (PLC Days @ 2:18 p.m.)
- Preschool classes dismiss at 11:45 a.m. or 3:45 p.m.
- All students must go directly home or to a school sanctioned after school activity.
- Teachers will escort students out their designated exit door.
- Parents are asked to stay in cars as they pick up students in the loading zones or determine a "Park & Meet" location across from the school, due to school traffic.

- Students will be ready to load from their assigned grade level zones thus cars must safely drive through the pick-up lines.
- School Campus (including the playground) is closed until 6:00 p.m. except for use by school clubs, groups and CLC.
- Please notify the school office by 3 p.m. if your child's dismissal plan changes for the day.

## PICKED UP BY PARENTS/ GUARDIANS

# ALL SIDEWALK AREAS ADJACENT TO THE SCHOOL PROPERTY ARE LOADING ZONES.

Students are assigned to grade level zones and will be waiting for parents to drive through the loading area. Teachers will assist students into cars when parents pull into their child's designated zone. There is NO PARKING in loading zones. Please read and follow cones and signage. Traffic should move northbound on N. 72nd Street and eastbound on Stanton Street while using loading zones. K, 2, 3 load in front of the school and 1, 4, 5 load on Stanton Street.

"Park & Meet" can be done on Douglas Street. Students will walk to meet parents at the agreed upon area. No parking in front of the school due to bus activity.

#### STUDENTS AND PARENTS ARE EXPECTED TO USE THE CROSSWALK AT ALL TIMES. Given the

amount of traffic it is not safe for anyone to cross the street between cars. A crosswalk is available directly in front of the school. Please use the crosswalk to ensure safety for all and model appropriate street crossing behavior for our students.

# **RIDING THE BUS**

Children who are "bus riders" line up in the main hallway prior to boarding the bus. Bus supervision staff will check off each student as they enter the bus. If your child will not be riding the bus on a particular day please notify the school office before 3:00 p.m.

## COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTER

Students who are scheduled to attend CLC clubs or core programming will report directly to the school gym to check in with CLC staff.

Parents should pick students up at Door #8 after 4 p.m.

## NORWOOD PARK PTO

Our parent-teacher organization is active in providing engaging family events throughout the school year. We encourage parents, and other family members, to actively participate in the group to plan and help with these events. Our PTO meets on the first Tuesday of each month. ## STUDENT USE OF TELEPHONE

Students will be permitted to call home from the school office regarding school matters with permission from school staff. Calls by students must be kept to a minimum, as there are a very limited number of phone lines in and out of school. Students are asked to make arrangements for participating in after-school activities and going home with a friend before leaving home in the morning. If you need to speak to your child by telephone during the school day, please call the office and the office staff will take a message to your child's teacher.

## **PARENTVUE:**






- 1. Maintain and foster high standards of academic achievement for my child.

- 6. Ensure my child **receives adequate sleep**, nutrition and attends school daily with on time arrival by 8:55 a.m. to Norwood Park.



# NORWOOD PARK -- PARENT INVOLVEMENT POLICY

#### A. POLICY INVOLVEMENT

- Parents are involved in the planning, review and improvement of the Parent Involvement Policy at our Annual Parent Meeting where they will be informed of Norwood Park's Title 1 participation. Translators will be provided for non-English speaking parents/guardians as necessary.
- A school-parent compact is jointly developed with parents, and reviewed annually. The compact outlines how parents, the entire school staff, and students share in the responsibility for improved student achievement. The compacts are reviewed and signed by parents at the beginning of the school year and at conference meetings.
- The Community Council, which includes parents, students, community, and staff members, meets regularly to review Title 1 programs and activities including after school programming and Community Learning Center programming. This includes, but is not limited to Parent Involvement Policy, School Compact, and components of the Title 1 Plan.
- Parents will be provided with timely information regarding curriculum, academic assessments used, and their student(s) proficiency levels through the following communications: Curriculum Night (August), Parent/Teacher Conferences (Fall/Winter), The Beep (school newsletter), Quarterly Report Cards and Summative Assessment results, and any other communication deemed appropriate by administrative or teaching staff.
- We will coordinate and integrate parental involvement programs and activities at the school level with other federal, state and district programs.
- Parents will be invited to meetings that are convened to plan for their child's education (i.e. SAT, MDT, IEP or 504) Parents may request a meeting with staff to plan for their child's educational needs.

#### B. SHARED RESPONSIBILITIES FOR HIGH STUDENT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

- The School/Parent Compact is annually reviewed, revised, and agreed upon by parents, community members, staff, and students.
- Our compact is annually distributed to all parents/students/staff in the fall and signed by all parties. It describes how parents, students, and the school staff, share in the responsibility for maintaining high academic achievement.

### C. BUILDING CAPACITY FOR INVOLVEMENT

To ensure effective involvement of parents, and to support a partnership among the parents, community and school to improve student achievement, we will:

- Provide materials and assistance in understanding Nebraska State Standards and Lincoln Public Schools Learning Objectives in reading, writing, math, and content areas. This will be done through district curriculum brochures, parent-teacher conferences, Curriculum Night, Annual Open House Event in August, newsletter articles and parent education opportunities at school.
- Student progress towards the standards will be reported to parents in the following ways: quarterly report cards, individual assessment data reports, parent-teacher conferences, student assistance team meetings and special education team meetings, parent-teacher written/oral communication logs.
- Provide opportunities for parents and their students to participate in family clubs and parent education courses to increase achievement levels of the students.
- Provide collaboration opportunities between staff and parents through various committees and organizations including, but not limited to: PTO, Community Council, School Improvement Committee, and the PBiS Committee.
- Send information related to school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities to the parents in a format and language they can understand through teacher generated newsletters, PTO meetings, School Improvement Committee, Community Council, the school/calendar handbook and the school web site.
- Provide an open door policy for parents to call, visit, or schedule meetings with staff members to improve communication and planning for student learning.
- Provide a wide array of activities that promotes parental involvement including, but not limited to PTO Family Events, parent, and family education through the Community Learning Center.

#### D. ACCESSIBILITY

- Parents will be provided opportunities for participation in their child's educational experiences. Parents, including limited English speaking, parents with disabilities, and thoe of migratory children.
- We will to the extent possible provide information and school reports in a format and in a language that parents can easily understand. REV: September 2021

### **POLICY 6443**

# **INSTRUCTION**

### PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

Lincoln Public Schools welcomes parental involvement in the education of their children. We recognize that parental involvement increases student success. It is Lincoln Public Schools' policy to foster and facilitate, to the extent appropriate and in their primary language, parental information about, and involvement in, the education of their children. Policies and regulations are established to protect the emotional, physical and social well-being of all students.

- A. Parental involvement is a part of the ongoing and timely planning, review and improvement of district and building programs.
- B. Parents are encouraged to support the implementation of District policies and regulations.
- C. Parents are encouraged to monitor their student's progress by reviewing materials sent home from school by school staff, online student information and quarterly report cards and attending parent-teacher conferences.
- D. Textbooks, tests and other curriculum materials used in the District are available for review by parents upon request.
- E. Parents are provided access to records of students according to law and school policy.
- F. Parents are encouraged to attend courses, assemblies, counseling sessions and other instructional activities with prior approval of the proper teacher or counselor and administrator. Parents' continued attendance at such activities will be based on the students' well-being.
- G. Testing occurs in this School District as determined to be appropriate by District staff to assure proper measurement of educational progress and achievement.
- H. Parents submitting written requests to have their student excused from testing, classroom instruction and other school experiences will be granted that request when possible and educationally appropriate. Requests should be submitted to the proper teacher or administrator within a reasonable time prior to the testing, classroom instruction or other school experience and should be accompanied by a written explanation for the request. A plan for an acceptable alternative shall be approved by the proper teacher and administrator prior to, or as a part of, the granting of any parent request.
- I. Participation in surveys of students occurs in this District when determined appropriate by District staff for educational purposes. Parents will be notified prior to the administration of surveys in accordance with district policy. Timely written parental requests to remove students from such surveys will be granted in accordance with District policy (6620, 6620.1, 6621.1). In some cases (see regulation 6621.1), parent permission must be given before the survey is administered.
- J. Parents are invited to express their concerns, share their ideas and advocate for their children's education with Lincoln Board of Education members, administrators and staff.
- K. School District staff and parents will participate in an annual evaluation and revision, if needed, of the content and effectiveness of the parental involvement policy.
- It is also the policy of Lincoln Public Schools to implement programs, activities and procedures for the involvement of parents in Title I programs consistent with the Title I laws, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. Such programs, activities and procedures shall be planned and implemented with meaningful consultation with parents of participating children.

# INSTRUCTION

## **REGULATION 6443.1**

### PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT IN TITLE I PROGRAMS

The policies set forth in this regulation apply to parents of students in Title I programs and have been established in order to implement programs, activities and procedures for the involvement of parents in Title I programs consistent with the Title I laws, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

### EXPECTATIONS FOR PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

It is the expectation of Lincoln Public Schools that parents of participating children will have opportunities available for parental involvement in the programs, activities and procedures of the District's Title I program. The term "parental involvement" means the participation of parents in regular, two-way and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring (A) that parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning; (B) that parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school; (C) that parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child; and (D) the carrying out of other activities, such as those described in this parental involvement policy. The District intends to meet this expectation through the following activities:

- A. Involving parents in the joint development of the District's Title I plan and the processes of school review and school improvement.
- B. Providing coordination, technical assistance and other support necessary to assist participating schools in planning and implementing effective parent involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance.
- C. Building the schools' and parents' capacity for strong parental involvement.
- D. Coordinating and integrating parental involvement strategies under Title I with parental involvement strategies under other programs.
- E. Conducting, with the involvement of parents, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the parental involvement policy in improving the academic quality of the schools served under the Title I program, including identifying barriers to greater participation by parents in Title I programs, with particular attention to parents who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy or are of any racial or ethnic minority background, and use the findings of such evaluation to design strategies for more effective parental involvement and to revise, if necessary, the parental involvement policies of the District.
  F. Involving parents in the activities of the schools served under Title I.

#### **POLICY INVOLVEMENT**

Each school served under the Title I program shall:

Convene an annual meeting, at a convenient time, to which all parents of participating children shall be invited and encouraged to attend, to inform parents of their school's participation under the Title I program and to explain the requirements of the Title I program.

Offer a flexible number of meetings, such as meetings in the morning or evening. If sufficient funds are provided for this purpose, the District may assist parental involvement in such meetings by offering transportation, child care or home visits.

Involve parents, in an organized, ongoing and timely way, in the planning, review and improvement of Title I programs.

# **INSTRUCTION**

### **REGULATION 6443.1**

Provide parents of participating children (1) timely information about programs under Title I, (2) a description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school, the forms of academic assessment used to measure student progress and the proficiency levels students are expected to meet; and (3) if requested by parents, opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their children and respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.

If the District operates a school-wide program under Title I and such plan is not satisfactory to the parents of participating children, submit any parental comments on the plan when the school makes the plan available to the District.

#### SHARED RESPONSIBILITIES FOR HIGH STUDENT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

As a component of the District's parental involvement policy, each school served under the Title I program shall jointly develop with parents for all children served under the Title I program a school-parent compact that outlines how parents, the entire school staff and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the means by which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the State's high standards. Such compact shall (1) describe the school's responsibility to provide high- quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the children served under Title I to meet the State's student academic achievement standards and the ways in which each parent will be responsible for supporting their children's learning, such as monitoring attendance, homework completion and television watching; volunteering in their child's classroom; and parenticipating, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their children and positive use of extracurricular time; and (2) address the importance of communication between teachers and parents on an ongoing basis through, at a minimum, (A) parent-teacher conferences in elementary schools, at least annually, during which the compact shall be discussed as the compact relates to the individual child's class and observation of classroom activities.

#### **Building Capacity for Involvement**

To ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the District, parents and the community to improve student academic achievement, each school participating in the Title I program and the District (1) shall provide assistance to participating parents, as appropriate, in understanding such topics as the State's academic content standards and State student academic achievement standards, State and local academic assessments, the requirements of Title I and how to monitor a child's progress and work with educators to improve the achievement of their children; (2) shall provide materials and training to help parents to work with their children to improve their children's achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement; (3) shall educate teachers, student service personnel, principals and other staff, with the assistance of parents, in the value and utility of contributions of parents and in how to reach out to, communicate with and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and the school; (4) shall, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parent involvement programs and activities with Head Start, Reading First, Early Reading First, Even Start, the Home Instruction Programs for Preschool Youngsters, the Parents as Teacher Program and public preschool and other programs and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers, that encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children; (5) shall ensure that information related to school and parent programs, meetings and other activities is sent to the parents of participating children in a format, and to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand; (6) may involve parents in the development of training for teachers, principal and other educators to improve the effectiveness of such training; (7) may provide necessary literacy training from funds received under Title I if the District has exhausted all other reasonably available sources of funding for such training; (8) may pay reasonable and necessary expenses associated with parental involvement activities, including transportation and child care costs, to enable parents to participate in school-related meetings and training sessions; (9) may train parents to enhance the involvement of other parents; (10) may arrange school meetings at a variety of times, or conduct in-home conferences between teachers or other educators, who work directly with participating children, with parents who are unable to attend such conferences at school, in order to maximize parental involvement and participation; (11) may adopt and implement model approaches to improving parental involvement; (12) may establish a district-wide parent advisory council to provide advice on all matters related to parental involvement in programs supported under Title I; (13) may develop appropriate roles for community-based organizations and businesses in parent involvement activities; and (14) shall provide such other reasonable support for parental involvement activities under Title I as parents may request.

### ACCESSIBILITY

In carrying out the parental involvement activities for this Title I Parental Involvement policy, the District shall provide full opportunities for the participation of parents with limited English proficiency, parents with disabilities and parents of migratory children, including providing information and school reports required under Title I in a format and, to the extent practicable, in a language such parents understand.

### USE, DISTRIBUTION AND UPDATING OF THIS POLICY

This Title I Parental Involvement Policy shall be incorporated into the District's Title I plan, shall be distributed to parents of participating children, shall be made available to the local community and shall be updated periodically to meet the changing needs of the parents and the school.

# BEHAVIORAL EXPECTATIONS FOR THOSE WHO RIDE THE LINCOLN PUBLIC SCHOOLS' BUSES

## Students are expected to follow safety rules at all times, including:

- a) Make sure the bus is stopped before leaving your seat to get off the bus.
- b) Never put any part of your body outside the bus windows.
- c) Don't talk unnecessarily to the driver while the bus is moving.
- d) Don't put anything in the bus aisles.
- e) Report any damage to the bus to the driver.
- f) Do not eat or drink on the bus. Possession or use of tobacco or alcohol is strictly prohibited.
- g) Don't push or run when getting off the bus.
- h) When crossing in front of the bus, watch for the driver's "all clear" signal before crossing the street.
- i) Get on and leave the bus only at your assigned stop.
- j) Cross the road or street in front of the bus before it has pulled away from the stop.
- k) Don't bring nuisance items on the bus, i.e., balls, spray cans, animals, water guns, skateboards, etc. Items such as weapons or look-alike weapons or equipment, which in any way would endanger the lives, health or safety of the children or other passengers and the driver are strictly prohibited. Look-alike weapons associated with a school-sponsored or approved activity may be transported only with written permission of a school administrator.
- I) Any items that would break or could produce injury if tossed about inside the bus when involved in an accident or sudden stop shall be secured.
- m) Behave in a manner that is polite and not offensive to others on or around the school bus.
- n) Follow the directions of the bus driver. Drivers have the authority to assign seats whenever such action is appropriate.
