
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
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

### LUNCHROOM PROCEDURES


My School Bucks is the name of our cafeteria cash register system. With the My School Bucks cash register system a parent/guardian deposits money into an account that is accessed by scanning their lunch card provided by the school.

### IMPORTANT RANDOLPH LUNCH INFORMATION

We ask that all students with guests sit at the guest table to ensure all other students have a seat in the cafeteria. Supervisors will be present to help guide you to the correct location. If you are eating a school lunch, please call the school by 10:00 to place your order. You will also need to bring exact change for your meal. Guests may purchase a lunch from the cafeteria or bring their own food. Guests may bring lunch for the student that they are visiting but cannot bring food for any other children due to the State and Federal Food Program guidelines. If a guest other than the child's guardian is having lunch with them, we ask that the guardian make the school aware before the guest arrives. We will not allow students to eat lunch with guests without the guardian's permission.

### ARRIVAL

The Randolph campus will be closed until 8:45 a.m. for the safety of students.

### **Arrival Times**

- Randolph School's campus is closed until 8:35 a.m. for students eating breakfast. There is no supervision until that time.
- Breakfast–Served between 8:35-8:55 a.m. Enter at door #1.
- Earliest arrival (unless entering for Cedars) is at 8:45 a.m. Students enter through the gym doors. There is no supervision until that time.
- Students line up between 8:45-8:55 a.m. in their supervised locations.
- Students arriving at the building after 8:55 a.m. must go to door #1
- School begins at 9:00 a.m.

### TRAFFIC PLAN

At Randolph School, we ask that if students are arriving by car, you drop off on D Street. At arrival, this lane must keep moving so please let your child out of the car and keep moving. If you would like to walk your child up to the school, please park on a street other than D or 37th. At dismissal, we ask that you pick up students along D Street. 37th Street is reserved for buses, daycares and individuals with special needs arrival and dismissal.

We ask that D Street is a one-way street during arrival and dismissal. Traffic should only go west during these times to alleviate traffic jams.

Our parking lot is closed between the times of 8:35 am and 9:00 am and 3:30 pm and 3:50 pm. Our parking lot is for staff and handicap parking during school hours.

### DISMISSAL-

### **Dismissal Times**

- Teachers will escort all students out their designated exit door at 3:38 p.m.
- All students must go directly home, to daycare, or to a school sanctioned activity after dismissal.
- Phone calls will be made if a child is kept 10 or more minutes after school for any reason.
- Parent/guardians must enter Door 1 to sign out their child if student has already been brought into the building.

### **Dismissal Areas**

- Students participating in Cedars will meet staff in the designated area.
- Participants in school sponsored activities will meet their supervisor at a designated area.
- Parents should arrange to pick up their child(ren) outside at the same location each day.
- Students staying after school must exit with the class and return with their teacher.
- Students will not be allowed to play on the playground while waiting for rides after school.
- School Campus (including the playground) is closed until 6:00 p.m. except for use by school childcare and clubs. Reservations for rooms/playground should be entered in the district Archibus system.


### DROP OFF AND PICK UP

- Use crosswalks at all times.
- To ensure children do not cross in the street, pick up and drop off your child(ren) on the curb side of the street.
- Follow flow of traffic when dropping off and picking up your child(ren).
- Do not use the parking lot or the bus loading zone (on 37th Street) to drop off or pick up your child(ren).
- Students plan to meet each other outside the building.
- Older students go to meet younger siblings at their designated door.
- Our campus is closed until 6:00 p.m. so families or siblings picking up Randolph students may not be on our playground until after 6:00 p.m.

### **COMMUNITY NEWS**





### **RANDOLPH ELEMENTARY PARENT INVOLVEMENT POLICY**

#### A. POLICY INVOLVEMENT


#### **B. SHARED RESPONSIBILITIES FOR HIGH STUDENT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT.**

We appreciate parent/guardians' conscientious regard for picking up homework for their child.


- If your child will be absent only one day, work may be made up or taken home upon return to school.


Classrooms will earn recognition for following school expectations. The awards are named after our therapy dogs. Our goal is to be able to recognize all students throughout a school year. Students are also recognized monthly for their effort in the classrooms with effort awards.

### GIFTS, TREATS AND INVITATIONS

Invitations will not be distributed during the school day. Phone numbers and addresses cannot be distributed by any school personnel.

Classrooms recognize birthdays in a variety of ways. Students are not allowed to bring birthday treats (edible or nonedible). Please do not send gifts, party favors, balloons or flowers. **These items will not be delivered to classrooms**.

Money cannot be collected to buy gifts for school personnel. Exceptions can be made in the case of personal misfortune, or if a special honor is being given to a student, parent/guardian or school staff member.



### **HISTORY OF RANDOLPH SCHOOL**

The history of the development of Randolph School begins back in the past century with the arrival of Lyman Frost and his family in Lincoln in 1868. The first school in the present Randolph area was in the upstairs of this pioneer's home located at what is now the Northeast corner of 33rd and Randolph Streets. The farm of Lyman Frost extended from 3rd to 40th Street with Randolph Street, then just a country dirt road as its southern border. The school consisted of 8 children and was taught by an older daughter of Mr. Frost while a small building was being erected on the Southeast corner of 33rd and Randolph Streets.




This building and the larger one that followed were the centers of social life for the community until a tornado demolished it. This building was called the "Frost School." Randolph school was never rebuilt in that location. For a time it was held in an old building farther south and in a rented building on the south side of Randolph Street between 26th and 27th streets. For several years Randolph students also attended school in the old Elliott Building at 26th and O Streets until the first Randolph School was built in 1901. It was a four room brick building and was erected at 26th and Randolph Streets where a city park, American Legion Park, stands today.


Classes were held at that location until our present structure at 37th and D Streets was completed in 1926. The architect that designed the new Randolph School was Ellery Davis Sr., one of the finalists in the competition to design the new State Capitol Building. The bid was accepted in February of 1925 with a scheduled completion date of January 1926. Randolph School was built in the middle of a field. South of Randolph were cornfields and a pond which was used for fishing in the summer and ice-skating in the winter. The "Lower Playground" was not developed and was off limits to students. A creek ran through it and there were many willow trees and bushes that grew there.

Randolph School has had four additions since it was built with its latest finished in 2017. The first was in 1951 when the present Art and Music rooms along with the upstairs third grade rooms, 212 and 211 were built. As the population of the school increased there was a need for two more additions, the east wing was built in 1953 and 1955 when Randolph's enrollment reached its peak of 729 students! The most recent renovation and construction project has added a new gym, library, cafeteria, kitchen, bathrooms, classrooms and a new secured entrance.

### BULLYING



If you feel that your child is being bullied by peers, please contact your child's teacher or the building principal, Monica Jochum. All reported incidences of bullying/unsafe behavior will follow the protocol outlined in Lincoln Public Schools Board Policy 5482: Anti-Bullying Policy.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.


In order to be considered bullying, the behavior must include:

- Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.
- Repetition: Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.
- Hurtful aggressive physical and/or verbal behavior.

Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose.

As an added prevention piece, please discuss with your child adults in the building who they can talk to if they feel that they are being bullied or are in an unsafe situation. These people may include, but are not limited to, their teacher, the administrator, school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker or any other adult in the building that they have built a positive relationship with.

Students are taught about what bullying looks like and sounds like, along with how to advocate for themselves through the District's Second Step program.



### **PERMITS TO TRANSFER**

If you would like to request that your child attend a different school than the one in your attendance area, you must complete an Application for Special Attendance Permit. Applications may be completed at the school in your area. You may leave the permit at the school where it will be forwarded to LPS Student Services for action. Decisions of approval or denial are based upon building capacity.

### **CHILD ABUSE**

#### **COMMUNITY RELATIONS, R1415, CHILD ABUSE**

Any Lincoln Public Schools employee who has reasonable cause to believe that a child has been subject to abuse or neglect or observes such person being subject to conditions or circumstances which would reasonably result in abuse or neglect shall report the same to: Protective Services, Lincoln Police Department, the Department of Social Services, and Lancaster County Sheriff Department.

Abuse or neglect is defined in Nebraska Statutes as follows:

Abuse or neglect shall mean knowingly, intentionally, or negligently causing or permitting a minor child or an incompetent or disabled person to be: (a) Placed in a situation that endangers his or her life or physical or mental health; (b) cruelly confined or cruelly punished; (c) deprived of necessary food, clothing, shelter, or care; (d) left unattended in a motor vehicle, if such minor child is six years of age or younger; or (e) sexually abused...

In addition to reporting the alleged abuse or neglect to the proper authorities, the employee shall also inform the employee's principal or other immediate supervisor of the alleged abuse or neglect.


### PTA

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### **INTENT OF STUDENT HANDBOOK**

This handbook is intended to be used by students, parents, and staff as a guide to the rules, regulations, and general information about Randolph Elementary School. Each student is responsible for becoming familiar with the handbook and knowing the information contained within it. Parents are encouraged to use this handbook as a resource and to assist their child in following the rules contained in this handbook.

Although information found in this handbook contains detailed and specific information on a variety of topics, the handbook is not intended to cover every

situation and circumstance that may arise during any school day, or school year. This handbook does not create a "contract." The administration reserves the right to make decisions and rule revisions at any time to implement the educational program and to assure the well being of all students. The administration will be responsible for interpreting the rules contained in the handbook. Should the situation or circumstance arise that is not specifically covered in this handbook, the administration will make a decision based upon all applicable school district policies, and state and federal statutes and regulations.

### Who Will Speak for the Children

This is a time of considerable conversation, of alarming headlines, of an uncertain future. In the midst of all the clamor about budget and boundaries and buses, about levies and lids and the legislature, who will speak for the children?

Who will speak for the children-for all of the children of all of the people? Who will speak for the children of this community and of this state?

Who will speak for the five-year-olds-those who enter school knowing they can do anything, and those who will enter school having already learned, from early lives of horror that we can only barely comprehend, that they can do nothing?

Who will speak for the 12-year-olds-those who on the brink of adolescence (and in their minds, adulthood) who can read and write and spell and dance and play basketball and paint and perform, and those who on the brink of adolescence (and in their minds, adulthood) who are sullen and aggressive, withdrawn and temperamental, convinced they can do nothing and they are worth nothing-and they're the same youngster, in the same body, within a 30-minute span?

Who will speak for the 17-year-olds, those in the last semester of their senior year, with scholarships, college, and the whole world before them, and those who are on the verge of dropping out of school, of family, and of life, and who believe they have nothing before them?

Will you speak for children–for all of the children of all of the people? Will you speak for Jamie and Kelsey and Danielle, whose wonderful stories I listened to just a few days ago?

Will you speak for Nick and Amanda and Joe, who have been expelled from school but are trying to learn how to do school better the next time?

Will you speak for Jacob and John and Erica and Allison, high school students who are trying to make their schools better places for all students?

Will you speak for Seth, the musician, and Amy, the athlete, and Tyler, the inventor, and Chelsea, the writer, and James, the scientist, and Claire, the painter?

I will speak for children-for all of the children of all of the people. I will speak for children from rich families and poor families. I will speak for gifted children and for children with disabilities.

I will speak for Juan and Anya and Loc and Surya, whose families have been in this country for less than a year, and who desperately want to learn to speak English and to become American citizens.

I will speak for Toby, whose gifts in math and science are so incredible most of us can't begin to understand them, and for Tony, who is still trying to speak his first word at the age of three.

I will speak for Jody and Jerrell and Becky, whose first-grade stories paint a picture of family violence that is quite simply unspeakable. I will speak for Taylor and Phyllicia and Melissa, who have had love and care and support from their families–always.

I will speak for Michael, who learned to read with great difficulty, and for Sarah, who seems to have always known how to read.

We must all speak for children–for all of the children of all of the people. We must speak for the children who laugh and the children who cry, the children who dream and the children who have nightmares.

We must speak for the children who learn easily and the children who struggle with every new task. We must speak for the children whose behavior is outrageous and for the children whose behavior is angelic.

We must speak for the children, not only because they are our future, but because they are children now. They have only one childhood, only one chance to be a kindergartner or a fifth-grader or a sophomore, only one chance to be a growing, developing, learning child.

In the conversation, the clamor, the talk of budgets and buses and buildings, of levies and lids and the legislature, children have no voice. Please, speak for the children.

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
